A Message from the President and CEO

In 1965, the Beatles performed the first stadium concert in the history of music, and Congress passed the Older

Americans Act (OAA) in response to the need for community social services for older people across America. Twelve years later, in 1972, a leap year and (fun fact) the longest year in recorded time, SeniorsPlus was born.

Its name, back then, was the catchy Western Older Citizens Council (WOCC), and its focus was on access to transportation. Two years later, WOCC rolled out Meals on Wheels



and information and referral and outreach services in Androscoggin, Franklin, and Oxford counties.

Since then, what is now SeniorsPlus, has continued to grow, assisting thousands in our community and reaching across the state. Paul McCartney is well past his 64th birthday and still performing. Meanwhile, SeniorsPlus works to embrace that kind of ageless enthusiasm the rock legend embodies, while also working to assist those who need our help in order to live a comfortable, purposeful life from home by offering a range of community services designed to address an array of needs.

With this publication, we present a snapshot of our proud history and look ahead to a bright future. We salute our community and are grateful for the thousands of employees, volunteers, and donors who helped us get here and who continue to support our work.

The mission of SeniorsPlus is to enrich the lives of older people and adults with disabilities, their families and communities, and to support them to make informed choices. SeniorsPlus envisions a future where all older adults and individuals with disabilities are engaged and respected while living quality, independent lives in the communities of their choice.

Looking Back... Eloise O'Neill, Executive Director 1981-2003

In 1977, Eloise began working in nutrition at what would become SeniorsPlus. She became the Executive Director in 1981, and remained in that role until 2003. Over the years, the name of the agency changed from Western Older Citizens Council, to Western Area on Aging, and finally, in 1998, to SeniorsPlus.

We caught up with Eloise O'Neill, age 85, in May as she was readying to go to her French class at the Franco Center in Lewiston. "I grew up here in Lewiston next door to three unmarried aunts and my grandfather, speaking French exclusively. It was good," said Eloise. "At ten, I started getting English lessons from a neighbor, and the rest is history," she said. "But now I have a really hard time with my French, so I decided to take this class."

"When I started, the "War on Poverty" had been launched and the government was giving out grant money for meal delivery — what would become Meals on Wheels.

It was an exhilarating time because we had money coming in, and were able to set up new programs and see what worked best, and what was most beneficial to people in the community. And the programs blossomed. Everyone was excited because it all was new and our work just kept getting bigger and bigger."

What makes you most proud as you reflect on that time in your life?

"The growth — the number of people who ended up getting serious services in their homes. These programs had never happened before — especially Meals on Wheels, which made such a difference to people, allowing them to remain at home. And the fact that it's all still going on, some 50 years later, is great.

My years at SeniorsPlus were so much fun. It was wonderful and very important work providing services to our clients who never complained."

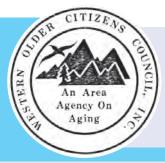
Is there a particular memory that stands out?

"I remember the Ice Storm of 1998 froze everything up, but our volunteers and staff came in and managed to get food to people. These clients were elderly people who did not want to leave their houses. Because of the storm and outages, some of them had no heat. So we had a lot of communication with them to make sure they were safe."

You are a very active octogenarian. What's your secret?

"To me, it's a matter of accepting your age and staying positive and involved in the community. After SeniorsPlus, I went back to school, then taught in the Lewiston Public School system and, more recently, until COVID shut things down for me, I volunteered at the Lewiston Public Library reading to children. And I have never given up reading the comics in the newspaper first thing."

- 10) Making technology accessible through education and the iPad Loaner Program, which has distributed 25 data-enabled iPads to area residents since 2019
- 11) Being a trusted, nonprofit resource for information and assistance, and an advocate for older people and people with disabilities
- 12) Coordinating resources for in-home supports including home modifications and Emergency Response Systems, improving home safety and providing peace of mind to clients and their families
- 13) Providing the Veteran's Independence Program reducing the need for nursing home care for veterans

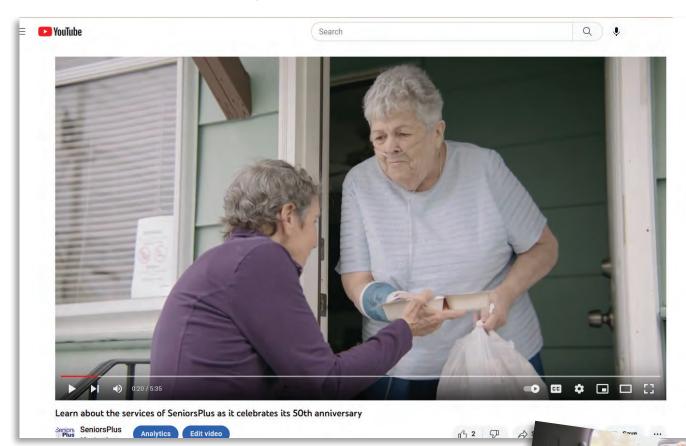

"Our presence in all three counties is so important and therefore more accessible to many people. The Education Center has grown and has such a variety of programs for many varied individuals. It also connects people who may not have interacted without this resource. The technology help is often referred to by my friends and neighbors. The wide territory for meals that are delivered is outstanding."

What has been especially rewarding for you?

"The management and staff are always so friendly and helpful. An important and necessary information gathering on many areas with referrals when necessary. There is such confidence in the agency that is wonderful to observe."

Client spotlight: Richard and Geneva Volunteer spotlight: Dave Anderson

Richard and his wife Geneva, of Farmington, have received weekly visits from Dave Anderson, their Money Minders volunteer who has helped them manage their bills and finances for the past three years.

Richard said, "Money Minders at SeniorsPlus is a blessing for us. We needed help managing our checkbooks and bills. We



love it when Dave comes to the house each week. He's like family to us. He catches my mistakes as he looks at my math in my checkbook. Sometimes he doesn't even need to use a calculator, because his brain is a human calculator. I don't know what we'd have done without Dave." Dave Anderson, on why he volunteers: "I generally come once a week... Technically you retire, but you still need something to do. I volunteer for a number of programs at SeniorsPlus. It keeps me busy. Gets me out of the house. One of the other programs I volunteer with at SeniorsPlus is Medicare advising, free Medicare counseling."

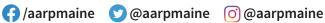

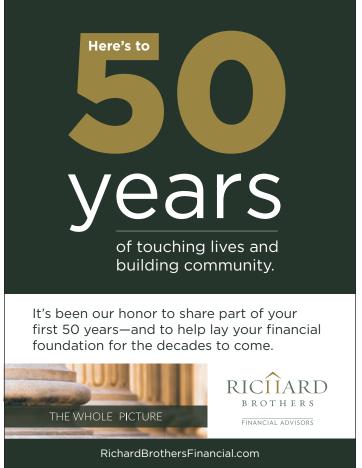

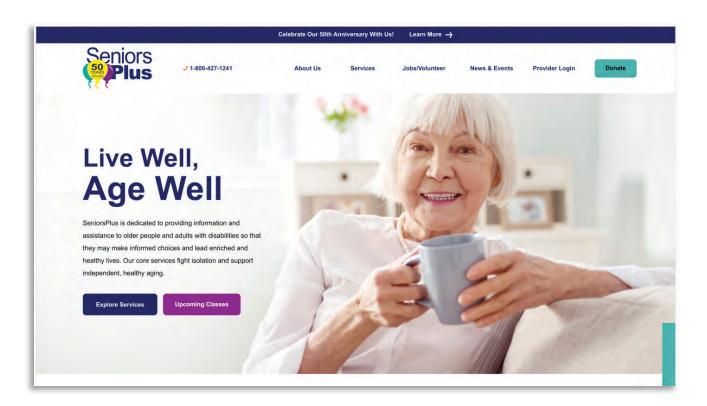
